Artistic Director's Concert Notes:

Humankind has a history of treating the elements as something that could and should be exploited for progress—and, of course, profit. This has defined the human experience, and has greatly influenced our relationship with the world around us. It's difficult to not view the land, water, trees, and even the stars above in terms of how they can be utilized in the service of humanity. It's an addiction that none of us can avoid participating in as we move through our life.

Poets, however, have long written of the natural world around them, in much different ways, and composers have jumped at the chance of putting these thoughts into song. These artists provide a glimpse into a different world, if only we knew how to recreate it.

Tonight's program presents works, mostly in English, by American composers (mostly young), with texts that chronicle our interaction with the world around us. We will sing this concert without intermission, a gentle walk through the natural world through song, standing under the starry sky, peering across the waters, living and working together in this valley, all looking for human companionship. We seek in our small way, to turn the darkness into light through our songs.

Biographies



Steven M. Zielke, (artistic director and conductor) Dr. Zielke is the Patricia Valian Reser Professor of Music at Oregon State University where he serves as director of choral studies and teaches choral conducting and choral music pedagogy. He earned his doctoral and master's degrees in choral conducting from The Florida State University and held the prestigious Clayton Krehbiel Fellowship, funded through the generous efforts of the late Robert Shaw.



Kyle Pederson

Raymund Ocampo (associate conductor) received a master's in choral conducting from the University of South Florida and served as the Bonita L. Bass Memorial assistant conductor for the Master Chorale of Tampa Bay. He received his bachelor's in music education from Concordia College where he studied with Dr. René Clausen and Dr. Paul Nesheim. He currently serves as music program chair and director of choral studies at Linn-Benton Community College.



Sandra Babb (guest conductor) is associate professor of choral music education at Oregon State University, where she teaches choral methods, vocal pedagogy, and choral conducting. She also directs OSU Bella Voce and the University Chorale, as well as the Heart of the Valley Chamber and Children's Choirs. Babb received her bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degrees in music education from Florida State University and is a National Center for Voice and Speech certified vocologist.



Joshua Rist (guest artist) is a native of Oregon and studied at Oregon State University where he earned his undergraduate and graduate degrees in music education and where he first began his journey as a choral composer. Rist is a three-time winner of OSU's Kraft Choral Composition Challenge. His music is published through Walton, Colla Voce, earthsongs, and MusicSpoke and has been performed by choirs throughout the world. His compositions have been performed at State, Divisional, and National ACDA and NAfME Conventions.

Rist regularly serves as a guest conductor/educator, leading choir retreats, directing honor choirs, and working as a clinician for choral festivals. He hosts a podcast called "Composition" where he converses with composers on their creative process and their insights on life and music.



Nicola Nine Zielke (collaborative piano) is the assistant director and vocal coach of the Oregon State University Chamber Choir. Nine, a mezzo soprano, is also a member of Oregon State University voice faculty and teaches German diction. Originally from Boise, Idaho, Nicola holds degrees in music from Friends University and the Wichita State University. An active performer, Nine is the resident collaborative pianist and vocal coach for the Corvallis Repertory Singers.
